## 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The college is affiliated to R.T.M. Nagpur University, which designs the syllabus. There is separate Board of Studies (BoS) for Rural Services. Some of the teachers were on the panel to prepare revised syllabus. Suggestions regarding changes in the syllabus are forwarded to Board of Studies for further action.

## 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The college has systematic system of internal assessment. The college restructured the internal assessment system. Oral examination and behavioural aspect were included as additional components

## 6.3.4 Research and Development

- The college has set up the research cell for the promotion of research aptitude among students and staff.
- The research cell motivates faculty members to write research papers / research articles.
- One UGC sponsored MRP has been completed and submitted to UGC by Dr S SKanode and Prof S. M. Sutar

## Two Best Practices of The Institution (2017-18)

# **Title: Vermicompost Training and Production**

**Goal:** To impart training and skills to the interested and needful students on vermicompost production, to make students aware about importance of organic farming, self employment and sustainable development.

The context: The department of community Development and Extension is involved in imparting training on vermicompost production. The main aim and objectives are to impart knowledge and skills among the students for promoting self employment, organic farming and sustainable development. The students participated in vermicompost production are specially from farming background. Hence, the knowledge and skills about vermicompost production are useful for the students from farming point of view.

**The practice:** the college is mainly concerned with rural community and most of the students of our college are from rural and farming background. So the department of Community Development and Extension came out with agro-based activity for the benefit of the students as well as farming community.

Evidence of success: The production of vermicompost is to be done by the trainee students. Under this process, the students kept cow-dung in the shed and applied little quantity of water on dung to minimize its temperature. The students prepared the beds under the guidance of teachers and also kept the earthworms on bed. During 45 days, students visited the project weekly and done the operations like watering, partial Harvesting and screening of vermicompost. The complete harvesting and sell of vermicompost is carried out by active involvement of students. Hence, students got knowledge and skills and developed confidence to initiate or to install vermicompost production unit. The vermicompost project has been initiated in the community with the help of trainee students. The fund of R's 2612/-is generated for college through vermicompost production and its consultancy services during 2017- 18.

**Problems encountered:** Management of vermicompost production throughout the year is a difficult task, especially during summer season. Timely availability of earthworms is also a problem for farming community, Pest attack on earthworms was encountered during the project period.

**Notes**: This practice is eco-friendly and important for soil health and sustainable development for farmers. Trainee students can also get monetary benefits.

## Title: Kitchen Garden

**Objective:** To impart knowledge and skills about cultivation of different vegetables in kitchen garden

The context: Kitchen garden is a place where vegetable are grown around the house for household use. If the vegetables are available at house, housewife can easily utilize it in their daily diet and save their money also. Most of our students are from rural community and they have farming background. Therefore, students can get knowledge and skills about cultivation of different vegetables in kitchen garden and can utilize it at their home.

**Practice:** Under kitchen garden activity, different vegetables like *Chawadi*(Cowpeas), *Gawar* (Cluster beans), *Bhendi* (Ladies finer), *Val* (Flat beans), *Wangi* (Brinjal), *Mirachi*(Chilli), *Kakadi*(Cucumber), *Lawaki* (Bottle gourd), *Dodaka*(Ridge gourd), *Kothimbir* (Coriander), *Methi* (Fenugreek), *Palak*(Spinach), grown on small area of college premises. The students were actively involved in all practices of vegetable cultivation such as seed bed preparation, sowing, fertilizer application, irrigation, weeding, spraying, harvesting, selling vegetables etc. The students got hands on experience about vegetable cultivation in kitchen garden. This activity was started on trial basis with meager initial investment of Rs100/- only to provide knowledge and hands on experience to the students about vegetable cultivation in kitchen garden and also to identify the constraints regarding kitchen garden.

**Evidence of success**: The 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> year students participated in this activity. It was new and applicable experience to the students at their home. Fourteen students started kitchen garden activity at their home in 2017. Community Development and Extension department also generated revenue of amount Rs. 470/- for college from the sell of vegetables.

**Problems encountered:** The vegetables like *Palak, Methi, Gawar, Lawaki, Kakadi* were suffered due to high rainfall. *Chilli*and*Brinjal*were suffered from pest infestation. During examination period, the activity was suffered to some extent.
